We collaborate with a number of other community organizations including the UW-Oshkosh College of Nursing, Human Leadership, UW-Madison and Fox Valley Memory Project. We work with Omro, Winneconne, Oshkosh and Menasha School districts. We partner with Rawhide Youth Services.

At BEAMING we apply the principles of equine assisted services to improve the lives of kids with autism, cerebral palsy, down syndrome, physical disabilities, and many other medical issues. We are the second in the nation to provide services to those diagnosed with Alzheimer, dementia and memory loss. The public schools send us kids who believe they just don't fit with their schoolmates and see no way out from their lives of despair. And then, there are our veterans. At BEAMING, we work with vets experiencing PTSD as well as physical problems. Our programs are conducted at our facility at 2692 County Road GG, Neenah, WI. The property includes a large indoor riding arena, outside arenas, paddocks, and the stable for our horses.

BEAMING, Inc. is a certified PATH (Professional Association of Therapeutic Horsemanship International) facility. Our programs are developed and supervised by Katie Samuelson, our Director. We rely on a cadre of dedicated volunteers. You do not need experience with horses to become a volunteer. We will train anyone interested in participating there's always things to be done at the farm.

Volunteer Opportunities (appropriate for ages 15+)

Horse Handler – Leads the horse. Requires training and experience.

Side Walker – Walk during riding sessions, provide encouragement and extra support. Lesson Prep- Greet riders possibly groom horses and help maintain covid cleanliness.

Camp Assistants - Camps are ran June, July and August.

General farm help and maintenance.

Education Assistant – Work with our special needs students to assist with instructions. Special Events Assistant – Clerical needs, event planning, greeters, etc.

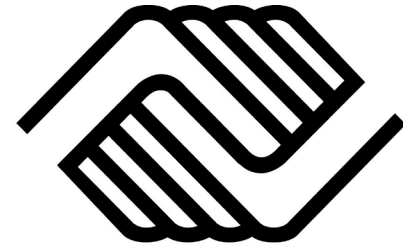

Cafe Attendant - Help sell snack items such as popcorn, candy and beverages while visiting with villagers and families in our Town Center.

Rickshaw Pilot - Provide rides to villagers on our facility rickshaw which is a bike with a carriage that villagers can ride in. Training is provided and required.

Personal Visitor - Provide socialization to villagers who may have little family involvement or have a need for extra social interaction. These visits may include discussing current events, playing games, reading magazines or books, writing a letter, using computers, interacting with villagers in the facility game room, going for walks indoors or outdoors, shopping, going to a movie, and much more!

Maintaining Bird Aviaries - Feed the birds and wash aviary windows in our two facility aviaries.

Pet Therapy - Visit villagers with your well-behaved, trained pet that is up to date with all vaccinations.

CASA of the Fox Cities seeks volunteers 21 and older to serve as Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) and/or committee members. Background check and references required.

Court Appointed Special Advocate - The primary role of these volunteers is to learn all that they can about their child and their families by engaging with them on weekly visits, lasting approximately one hour. During these visits advocates are observing the child and gathering information so they can identify if the child's needs are being met. The information is compiled into a monthly report that will be used by the court system as decisions are made about the child's future. The children served have been through a lot and CASA volunteers provide consistent, caring support during uncertain times. This is an opportunity to profoundly impact the life of a child. JA Capstone Programs

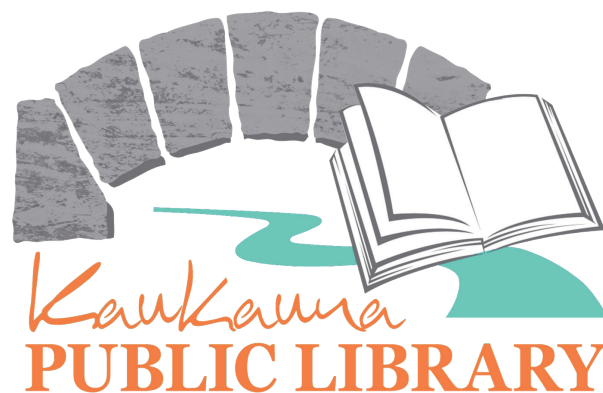

Located on the FVTC campus in Appleton, JA BizTown gives students the chance to be both producers and consumers as they work together to operate a credit union, restaurant, city hall, media center, manufacturer, retail store and several other businesses with the goal of managing their personal finances and helping their business be successful.

JA Finance Park is a 5-hour fieldtrip experience for 8th-12th graders that focuses on financial literacy. In this simulation students are provided a life scenario, income, and credit score that they will use for the day as they set a budget. They will then use that budget to make choices about housing, transportation, entertainment and other budget categories. This simulation helps students gain valuable insight as they begin to make decisions about their careers and further education, as well as the importance of saving and money management.

As a JA Capstone volunteer, you will be assigned to a small group of students as they work through their day. Training is provided and you are also encouraged to share your personal experiences to further enrich student experience. If transportation is not available, Make The Ride Happen and Community organizations will attempt to fill the gaps. One way we help to fill the gaps for clients and their families/caregivers is through a volunteer driver program. Another program we offer is Cycling Without Age.

Cycling Without Age is a worldwide movement that aims to bring joy and vitality to older adults and those with differing abilities through the magic of the trishaw, a pedal assist cargo bike.

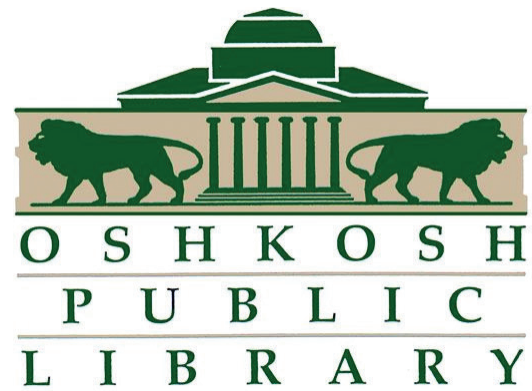

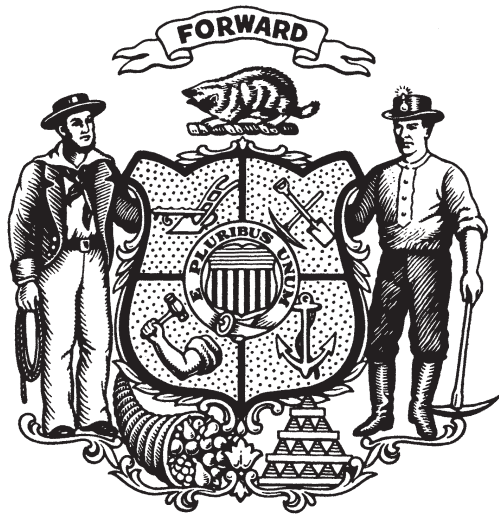
Greeter - As the first point of contact, the greeter is essential to creating a welcoming atmosphere for tax filers. Primary responsibilities include welcoming tax filers, providing intake forms. Some greeters may be asked to assist with categorizing returns. Strong interpersonal communication skills are required.

Scanner - As a scanner, you will scan taxpayer documents into a virtual portal using scanning equipment. No tax prep experience necessary. Basic computer skills required.

Income Tax Preparer - As an income tax preparer, you will prepare basic/advanced tax returns using intake forms, taxpayer documents and computer software. No tax preparation experience necessary. Basic computer skills are required.

Intake Screener - As an intake screener, you will verify the identity and help taxpayers fill out their intake forms. You will ensure the taxpayers have all necessary information and documents to complete their tax return.

Reviewer - Reviewers will work with tax filers to discuss and review completed income tax returns. You will ensure tax filers receive all credits available to them and that they are computed correctly. Income tax background or VITA experience is required.
